SCHEDULE B(1):PROTOCOL FOR MAORI HERITAGE SITES

The scheduled sites are within the Auckland City Council boundaries and are included in Schedule B of Appendix 3 to the Central Area Section of the Proposed Plan. The list of sites may be added to as consultation with Maori continues and develops.

1. Protocol - Introduction

This Protocol has been developed to provide a greater degree of certainty in relation to any scheduled Maori Heritage Site. Activities provided for on Maori Heritage Sites are listed in the Activity Table in Rule 10.13.4 of the Plan.

2. Further Information - Consultation with Maori

Two of the Maori iwi who claim mana whenua within the boundaries of the Auckland City Council are:-

- a) Ngati Whatua
- b) Ngati Paoa

All consultation in respect of Maori Heritage Sites should be with the Ngati Paoa Whanui Trust when the sites are located within Ngati Paoa rohe, and with Ngati Whatua o Orakei Maori Trust Board when the sites are in the Ngati Whatua rohe. Consultation requires genuine consideration of sufficient information received in adequate time to be considered with an open mind.

The particular focus will be upon tangible (Tinana) and spiritual (Wairua) issues with practical and achievable outcomes

3. Waahi Tapu - Sacred Places

In relation to most Waahi Tapu the iwi have restricted the boundaries to a minimum considered necessary for the protection of the tinana and the wairua. Every place was a sacred place, some more so than others. For example:

- a place that has had contact with the dead
- a battlefield
- a burial place
- a place where a tupapaku landed from a canoe, rested, was placed for tangi
- · a house site
- · a place of refuge
- a place of contemplation
- · a mountain from which territory was claimed
- · where a famous song or chant was first uttered
- where a vision occurred
- where a rite was performed
- Any place touched by mana became tapu.
